Benefits to Early World Language

Brain Research & Cognitive Benefits

• Learning a second language boosts problem-solving, critical-thinking, and listening skills, in addition to improving memory, concentration, and the ability to multitask

Peaking interest in other cultures

 Students develop a better understanding and appreciation of other cultures needed to build intercultural competence

Beginning journey toward proficiency

Early and longer sequences also provide the opportunity for learners to develop proficiency

Where We Have Been?

- 2019 Elementary Program Grades 3-5
 - Spanish
 - o 1x week 45 minutes
 - Focus Language/Culture
 - Special for students/ prep for teachers

Brainstorming

- Committee of teachers and building principals met to review the previous EWL program in Irvington.
- Partnered with World Language Consultant, Lea Kennedy to look at possible models and best practices.
- Discussed how to meet the academic/SEL needs of the students while integrating EWL into the existing curriculum/schedule.

Impact on Schedule/Time Constraints/Space

- Library as a special removed
 - Early literacy skills
 - Reading skills and explicit instruction
 - Writing skills and explicit instruction
 - Research and presentation skills
- Additional lost instructional time for book check out
- No physical space for program in DL or MSS
 - Needs to be language push-in model, on a cart

Proposal of EWL for 2023-24

Goals:

- To introduce students in grades K-5 to the languages/culture of Spanish and French.
- To develop speaking, listening and writing skills in target languages.
- To build/foster an interest in learning a new language.
- To provide an enriching, immersive learning experience.
- To begin to build a foundation in World Language that can connect students earning the Seal of Biliteracy in High School by establishing a long and strong sequence.

Proposal

- Kindergarten 1st Grade
 - Spanish
- 2nd Grade 3rd Grade
 - French
- 4th Grade 5th Grade
 - ½ semester French, ½ semester Spanish (to provide students the opportunity to choose a language to study in middle school)
- Library Schedule -
 - change to push-in collaboration with homeroom class
 - Schedule book check-in/check-out for all students

Next Steps

- Hire 2 EWL teachers- approximate expense: \$128,927/teacher (inclusive of salary and benefits)
 - Spanish
 - French
- Plan for Program
 - Selection and purchase of instructional materials
 - Professional development- continuing to work with WL consultant and WL teachers
 - Curriculum
 - Location
 - Carts x4
 - Storage for carts

Connecting the Dots

Seal of Biliteracy:

To earn the NYSSB, students must demonstrate Intermediate High proficiency in English and the required level of proficiency in one or more world languages set

forth by the NYS Learning Standards for World Languages, adopted by the NYS Board of Regents in March 2021.

World Language Students can earn 3 points toward the NYSSB in a number of ways, including:

- Demonstrating proficiency on the AAPPL test (already administered in Irvington).
- Demonstrating proficiency by completing a culminating project that is presented to a panel of 2.

Requirements to Earn the NY Seal of Biliteracy

Students need to earn a total of 3 points in English and 3 points in World Language:


- Completing coursework in English and/or a world language with an average of 85% or better;
- Completing a Home Language Arts Program with an average of 85% or better;
- Earning a set score on an approved assessment in English and/or a world language;
- Demonstrating successful completion of coursework from a nation outside the U.S.; and
- Completing and presenting a Culminating Project in English and/or a world language that demonstrates the required level of proficiency in all three modes of communication (Interpretive, Interpersonal, and Presentational).

Why Award the Seal of Biliteracy

 Encourage students to pursue biliteracy, honor reading, writing, speaking and listening skills in a second language, that are attractive to future employers and college admissions.

 Add recognition to transcripts to highlight a high level of proficiency for employers, military, post-secondary.

 Celebrate the success and proficiency that Irvington students possess demonstrating intercultural competence needed for a global society.



Benefits of Awarding the Seal of Biliteracy for Post-Secondary

- College credit is given to students who earn the Seal:
 - 4 states, <u>by law</u>, offer college credits:
 - Illinois, Minnesota, Hawaii, Maine
 - o 2 states, by policy, offer college credits:
 - Missouri and Mississippi (pending work)
- Seal of Biliteracy is used for placement decisions in modern language courses

Connecting the Dots

Seal of Biliteracy:

- We would need to begin to plan in the Spring for a pilot in 2023-24:
 - Committee of ELA and WL teachers in April/May
 - Conversations with Guidance
 - Create Student Application
 - Parent and Student Communications
 - By December 1st, the District needs to submit application to NYSED
 - Identify Seniors interested in applying for the Seal
 - Students applying will take all 4 sections of the AAPPL (\$10 per student)
- For future years:
 - A stipend for a teacher to oversee the process or
 - One prep a day to plan for assessments, panel presentations
